Topic: *“Fundamentals of Ethics in Law Enforcement”*

She brings an array of public service and public safety experience to her role as a professor for Corban, including having served as a legal intern to the former Governor of Wyoming and United States Secretary of the Interior, performing legal research and writing for former Wyoming Chief Justice Robert Rose, serving as a Deputy District Attorney in the 7th Judicial District of Colorado, and ultimately finding her law enforcement career home with the Federal Bureau of Investigation where she served as a Special Agent for over 28 years, retiring in July 2019.
