Whether it meant contacting a legislator, providing testimony, serving on a workgroup or being part of our strategic response team, our membership has once again shown how committed we are to fulfilling the OACP mission.

One of the most enjoyable responsibilities as OACP President is recognizing members for outstanding work on behalf of OACP. This year, I am recognizing three members for their significant contributions to OACP. Those members are: Chief Dave Rash, Chief Mitch Hicks, and Chief Don Taylor.

As you all know, our last several "in-person" conferences were cancelled due to COVID restrictions. As Co-Chairs of the Conference & Training Committee, Chief Rash and Chief Hicks took the lead and collaborated with OACP staff and their committee members to develop and deliver training in a virtual environment. This was a "first" for OACP and the dedication and commitment demonstrated by Dave and Mitch is certainly worthy of recognition.
